Hello Everyone,

2019 is shaping up to be a good year for your cooperative, as income has been better than budgeted, and we will receive another special distribution from our funding bank, AgFirst Farm Credit Bank. The exact amount of the AgFirst distribution will not be determined until late in December, but it will help ensure a very good patronage refund.

In keeping with the cooperative principle of providing learning opportunities for our members, we kicked off our ninth annual AgBiz Planner

session for young farmers in September. This online course, developed by Dr. Dave Kohl and offered through Farm Credit University, teaches young and beginning farmers important financial management and business planning skills. One of our relationship managers mentors each participant, and Colonial Farm Credit covers the majority of the cost of the course. By the conclusion of the course, each participant will have written a business plan for his/her own operation. Our current class will graduate this January. If you are interested

in the AgBiz Planner course but are strapped for time, our AgBiz Basics class is a new offering that offers a portion of the "Planner" curriculum online.

Did you know that it is estimated that two-thirds of U.S. farmland will transition either to new ownership or out of production in the next 20 years? This transition is a major issue that is often overlooked due to the weather and prices challenges that capture headlines. Farmland transition is a big reason why we're continually promoting education with AgBiz Planner and the Colonial Agricultural Education Foundation.

Farm advocacy and networking are also ways that we can prepare the next generation of farmers for the challenges ahead. If you were at the Young Farmer Awards Breakfast at the Virginia Farm Bureau convention in early December, you may have heard me mention this. Farm Bureau's Young Farmer Program has been an outstanding way for folks to advance their careers in agriculture and we are proud to be a supporter of that program. 



# Mission in Uganda



This summer, Colonial Farm Credit customers Jimmie and Beth Blake had the privilege of going on a mission trip to Uganda with a team of 13 from Petsworth Baptist Church in Gloucester, Virginia. The group had been sponsoring a little girl named Elizabeth as a student to the Hanna Moshi Primary School outside of Jinja, Uganda. Elizabeth's father is a farmer and pastor in their community and is financially unable to send her to school because in Uganda, there is no free education. So, Elizabeth has been part of the sponsorship program to have the tuition paid to enable her to attend school. The church group has also been helping provide Elizabeth's family with tools to earn income, which includes fruit trees to help feed the family but also provide income through the sale of mangoes and passion fruit.

One of the best parts of the trip was when the group was finally able to meet Elizabeth and her family. Because Elizabeth's father is

a farmer and has experience caring for his landlord's animals, they provided him with his own cow to help produce more income. The White family, missionaries stationed in Uganda, and the Gloucester-Mathews Farm Bureau were instrumental in helping them accomplish this goal. GMFB helped financially with the purchase of the cow and the Whites helped locate a suitable cow for sale, which the group presented to the family. They hope to help him add to his livestock with some chickens and goats in the future.

On the trip, the mission group did work at Hanna Moshi Primary School, where there is no electricity or water and over 1,000 students. Pastor Robert, the director of the school, and some of the older children get up at 4:00 am each morning and walk to a water source to carry hundreds of gallons of water for daily use by faculty and students. Petsworth Baptist Church is providing finances for a well and storage tank to be installed for them in the near future.


