

A Message From Paul



Paul Franklin President, Colonial Farm Credit

I am happy to report that we set a new record for patronage distributions with \$17.9 million paid in early April. We accelerated the timing of the payment again to help with challenges tied to COVID-19. The record payout was due to stable recurring earnings plus an extraordinary special distribution from our funding bank, AgFirst Farm Credit Bank. This marks our 23rd consecutive year of patronage distributions. Over this timeframe, we have paid \$167 million in profits back to our customers. We feel very fortunate to be able to provide a competitive interest rate and return a large patronage refund. This is a benefit that only a financially-sound, customer-focused cooperative can provide.

We are off to a good start in 2021. Year to date net income through March 31st was above budget, at \$3.6 million. All measures of capital adequacy are strong, which will help us significantly if any challenges are encountered.

Three employees are reaching major milestones and retiring from Colonial Farm Credit: Jim Belfield, Susan Goodrich, and Amy Kusmin. Each of them worked in different areas of our cooperative. They all contributed greatly to our success. I asked them if they would offer their thoughts on working here either by responding to a few questions or sharing thoughts in general. They were gracious, as they always are, and provided these responses:

What has changed the most since you've been with Colonial Farm Credit?

Susan: "Technology has changed the most. Over the years there have been many positive changes in technology. It has brought ease of mobility and access to information, is cost efficient and saves time, which has been very valuable in the banking industry."

Jim: "Technology has absolutely changed the most. We are able to do more in less time with fewer people and provide better service. The pace of the day has also increased about ten-fold. Every day brings a new challenge and a new opportunity. I found the pace invigorating and enjoyed the daily challenges."

What is your favorite part of the job (and/or what will you miss the most)? **Susan:** "I have enjoyed getting to know and being able to help our customers obtain their financial goals. I have met so many nice people throughout the years. My career has been very rewarding and with many opportunities to succeed. Our employees are like family and I will miss them very much as well."

Susan: "Farm Credit is a customer owned cooperative. Our profits benefit our customers through our patronage refund program. We are experts in the agricultural industry. We have employees that are dedicated and are also very actively involved in the community."

"As I look back on what is a relatively short time with Farm Credit, I am extremely grateful to the leadership team for hiring me. I am extremely grateful to have received the Colonial Agricultural Educational Foundation scholarship for the past three years. It is humbling to think that complete strangers have so generously invested in my future. This has taught me the importance of paying it forward and supporting your community. I will never forget the impact this endowment has made on my educational aspirations. With a lot of hard work, dedication, and the help of CAEF, I will be graduating from Virginia Tech this May- in three years instead of four. I will attain a Bachelor of Science in Water: Resources, Policy, and Management. This major is part of the Department of Forest Resources and Environmental Conservation in Tech's College of Natural Resources and Environment. This degree appealed to me as a forward-thinking individual. Water is always around us and will always be essential, for agriculture and all other aspects of living. It is arguably our most important natural resource. It also plays into my interest in outdoor hobbiesbeing a huge fisherman myself- and overall appreciation for the environment and what it provides for us. Through my college experience, I have learned about major water challenges and solutions, the mechanics behind hydrologic systems, water quality impacts of agriculture and other human activities, and related environmental policies and laws. Truthfully, it is hard to condense all that I have learned into a few short sentences. College has changed how I view and understand the world around me. I have accumulated over 424 volunteer hours in service of organizations such as the National Park Service/Richmond National Battlefield Park, Pole Green Historic Church, the Pamunkey Regional Library, and more. My senior year of high school I participated in a mentorship with the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries assisting with outdoor education programs. - Individual purchases will begin counting towards our organization within 7-10 days of registering your Kroger Plus card.
- Individuals will be required to re-enroll their designated organization annually
- The organization will only be informed of the number of supporters and our total amount of donation from Kroger. We will not receive information about individual card usage.
