I am extremely thankful and honored to have been the recipient of a Colonial Agricultural Educational Foundation scholarship each year of my undergraduate education. These scholarships have allowed me to be successful during my time at North Carolina State University. It has allowed me to learn, grow, and explore. I will graduate this December with a bachelor's degree in Poultry Science and minors in Genetics and Biology. The Foundation's assistance has been beneficial in reducing the costs of my undergraduate education that would have then hindered opportunities to go on to graduate school.



As I was growing up, I found that the agriculture community in my home county was always supportive of each other and strived to share and support the youth and students in our area. From the Anne Arundel County Farm Bureau, to the Southern High School FFA Alumni, to the 4-H leaders, everyone wanted to share their knowledge, support, and experiences. As you venture out into the world you wonder if you will find the same networks and support. I have found that not only is the agriculture community supportive at home in my own county, but as I have met people across the United States, I find the same willingness to share knowledge, mentor, and develop relationships. Although I am at NC State and call Anne Arundel County, Maryland home, I have friends and colleagues that are studying agriculture at universities

across the country. I have previously met people at FFA and 4-H conferences and am now meeting up with them in Kansas City at Agriculture Future of America and the International Production & Processing Expo (IPPE) in Atlanta, GA. These conferences give so many opportunities to network and build relationships. It is exciting to have a national network of friends and colleagues that I can collaborate with and discuss ideas. My friends in other areas of study do not seem to have the opportunities that the agriculture community and industry offer.

During my undergraduate career, I have studied and worked hard, that is a given, but I have also had so many opportunities and experiences to enhance my education. I have worked as a lab assistant, served as a club officer for poultry science, was a member of the Western Riding Team, lived with a family in Spain and studied Spanish, and was able to share my passion for agriculture and the opportunities it presents as both a College of Agriculture and Agriculture Future of America (AFA) ambassador. In addition to being a lab assistant this year, I am currently a Teaching Assistant for two professors, assisting with their classes in Poultry Anatomy and Physiology and Intro to Poultry Science. The opportunities never seem to end.

I have worked in the lab at NC State, for the past two and a half years, gaining hands-on experience and knowledge in immunology, pathology, nutrition, and parasitology through our lab research on histomoniasis in turkey poults. I had the opportunity to analyze data and create graphics, which I used for a poster that I presented at the national Food Animal Innovation Summit. It was very exciting! My poster from this research was entered into a graduate student poster competition, in which my poster was selected for first place. I have also had the opportunity to participate and assist in running numerous commercial company-sponsored trials to evaluate potential treatments for histomoniasis.

I have had internships with two top poultry breeding/genetics companies. My first internship was at the initial onset of COVID and luckily was not canceled. I spent the summer in Siloam Springs, Arkansas with Cobb Vantress, where I spent time working on a pedigree farm, shadowing the geneticist and learning management practices from incubation in the hatchery to artificial insemination of breeders. The following summer I earned a position as a veterinary service intern with Aviagen, Inc. in Elkmont, Alabama. This opportunity not only brought me face to face with the issues the poultry industry is struggling with but also gave me actual field practice in taking viable cell counts, isolating bacteria, taking on-farm samples, performing necropsies, and recognizing abnormalities in flocks and bio security procedures. Not only did I have exceptional internship opportunities, but the relationships I developed with other interns and the teams at Cobb and Aviagen have been instrumental in determining my plans for the future.

Animal agriculture is an extremely important commodity and I want to contribute to the poultry industry because of its extreme value to our economy and the nutritional value it holds. I am hoping to work for a company or land grant university that shares my passion and interest for the development of innovative alternatives to antibiotics

and immunological research. I have a particular interest in the evolving, increasing antibiotic resistance that is being experienced in both human and veterinary medicine. The poultry industry is moving toward antibioticfree production of meat and eggs but that movement has encountered problems with certain diseases, which has on occasion limited the production of poultry products in some companies. The lack of permissible



antibiotics in the industry makes treatment limited and difficult. This is one of the driving reasons for my interest in researching immunology and, more specifically, antibiotic resistant pathogens.

I plan to go on to graduate school next fall and I am still waiting on my application submissions. Wish me luck! I believe graduate school will give me the foundation and investigative skills necessary to contribute to the immunological research community and give me inspiration as I look for ways to support animal agriculture and continue to do research in this discipline. Public understanding and perception are important so I would like to fully develop my science communication skills as I believe that it is important for scientists to communicate their research well to different audiences.

I am excited as I look towards the future and am sincerely thankful to the Colonial Agricultural Educational Foundation for investing in my education so that I could have the opportunity to learn and develop into a professional in the agriculture industry. I hope to mentor and inspire others that are just starting their educational path in the coming years.

State Fair of Virginia




