

A Message From Paul



Paul Franklin President, Colonial Farm Credit

I am pleased to report that we set a new record for patronage distributions with \$18.5 million paid in early April. This amount was roughly \$600 thousand higher than the previous record set last year. The payout was due to good levels of recurring earnings for our cooperative plus an extraordinary special distribution from our funding bank, AgFirst Farm Credit Bank. AgFirst was able to take advantage of falling interest rates and pass along a portion of its earnings to our Association. This marks our 24th consecutive year of patronage distributions. Over this time frame, we have paid \$185 million in profits back to our customers. We feel very fortunate to be able to provide a competitive interest

rate and return a large patronage refund. This is a benefit that only a financially-sound, customer-focused cooperative can provide.

In conjunction with the mailing of patronage checks, I had the pleasure of visiting 16 customers with seven of our relationship managers. These visits are an important way to thank you for choosing Colonial Farm Credit and gain a better understanding of your business needs and challenges. These visits remind me that we have a diverse and strong agricultural base. Weather and prices represent a continual challenge. However, our farmers are adapting and taking advantage of markets and consumer trends. I am always excited to participate in these visits, and I want to thank everyone who took time to meet with me.

In this edition of the Leader, you will find that we recently held a financial seminar with Farm Bureau focused on young, beginning, and small farmers. I thank Ron Saacke, with Virginia Farm Bureau, for helping us organize the event and Dr. Alex White for his presentation and discussion. Dr. White shared valuable information on how to ensure our young, beginning, and small farmers are well positioned to succeed. We are off to a good start in 2022. Year to date net income through March 31 is \$3.6 million and exceeds the budget by \$560 thousand. All measures of capital adequacy and credit quality are strong, which will help us significantly if any challenges are encountered.

It is with sadness that I report that we lost three great contributors to our organization with the recent passing of Board members Wayne Kirby (Hanover County VA) and Bobby Jones (Prince Edward County VA) and employee Sherry Moore (Mechanicsville VA office).

Wayne was elected to our Board of Directors in September of 2005. He served in various leadership roles throughout the years, including Board Chair from 2010 through 2013. At the time of his passing, he served as a director on at least four other agricultural organizations, including the Colonial Agricultural Educational Foundation. Wayne always looked for opportunities to help young people achieve success, serving as a mentor to countless people over the years. In addition to running his family farm,

Wayne was a highly successful crop input consultant and salesman. Wayne was a problem solver, and his counsel was readily received by everyone, whether a tenured board colleague or a startup farmer.



Bobby was elected to our Board of Directors in September of 2013. He served on various committees through the years, most recently with the Audit Committee and Vice Chair of the Legislative Committee. Like Wayne, Bobby was serving a key role on at least four other community and county boards. With very little outside help, Bobby ran a large dairy operation for many years, yet found time to be a leader in the community. Whether the need was to run a meeting for a large agribusiness cooperative or volunteer to cook stew for a fundraiser, Bobby was always ready to help.

If there is one thing I have learned in this life it is to trust in the Lord as the Lord has proven Himself trustworthy. I have been continuously indecisive about my goals throughout life, but have strived to keep a mindset of consistently staying true to myself and my passions, which has led me to some amazing opportunities. I am so incredibly thankful to have received one of the Colonial Agricultural Educational Foundation scholarships every year of my academic career at Virginia Tech. This funding was incredibly impactful in allowing me to follow opportunities and adapt to the constant changes of college. I graduated in December of 2021, finishing my bachelor degree in two and one-half years with a major in Agribusiness and a minor in Crop, Soil, and Environmental Science. I was blessed to be able to finish my degree early; however, it meant that a majority of my college career was spent behind a computer taking online classes due to COVID. That was not exactly the Virginia Tech experience I was expecting there, especially after hearing stories my whole childhood from my parents who both completed a bachelors and masters at Virginia Tech.

I grew up on a small beef cattle farm in the equally small town of Jetersville, Virginia, which was affectionately referred to as "Morrisville" by several of my teachers due to the fact that my big family made such a prominent proportion of the population. This helped me to form strong values built around God, family, and community, and develop a passion for agriculture and giving back to those around me. I have been working on the farm and heavily involved with training and competing horses for as long as I can remember. I learned countless lessons from these environments while at my mother's side and developed a mindset of fierce independence and a borderline unhealthy inclination to leap off the edge of my comfort zone. Throughout school, this led me to join FFA and compete in public speaking as president of the chapter, become 1 of 16 students to attend governor's school and earn my associates degree in high school, and earn the title of salutatorian.

I realize the slight air of arrogance in my words above, but each of those accomplishments laid the foundation for me to be able to attend Virginia Tech. More importantly, they gave me the academic merit to earn enough in scholarships to pay a majority of my tuition. My time at Virginia Tech was spent continuing the cultivation of my passion for agriculture despite

being guite different than I was expecting. I could write a book about the struggles of working and being in college while enduring the woes of COVID, but plenty of others have already written that story. I would prefer my time at Tech be defined by the network I became a part of, made up of a brilliant new generation of agriculture. In addition to being in the small major of Agribusiness, I was also an active member of Block and Bridle. Nearly every single person I met here had the same soul-on-fire mentality about agriculture and they constantly renewed my faith in the future of the industry. While it was abbreviated and an unfortunate majority of my time was spent trapped in an apartment, Virginia Tech gave me connections, experiences, and created opportunities to last a lifetime. Most notable of these opportunities were the two summers of my college career. The first an agronomy internship where sweat earned a new meaning while working in a tobacco field. Then the second, which became the most impactful experience of my life when I packed up all of my stuff, including the Virginia Tech college of zoom, and drove to Montana in the middle of spring semester to work on a ranch.

When I entered my final semester of college, I was just as clueless about my future as my very first day. My only real goals were to find a career where I could become a part of the agricultural community that made me who I am and be able give back to it in some way. During a class with Dr. Alex White the concept of agricultural lending became fascinating to me and after asking about careers in the field Doc White had three interview opportunities for me within the week - I will be forever grateful for his help as a teacher and mentor. After graduating in December, I was hired to join the team of loan officers at Colonial Farm Credit in the West Point Office and was working by January. A year ago, I was guarantined in my apartment with no clue of what I wanted to do and applying for every single scholarship that I could find in order to be able to pay tuition and still be able to eat. I could never have imagined that today I would be involved with the very same scholarship process that was so impactful to my success at college and I never could have guessed how much my life would change in that time. I am blessed to be in a career where I am fueled by my passions every day and I cannot wait to see what else this life as in store for me.

- Individual purchases will begin counting towards our organization within 7-10 days of registering your Kroger Plus card.
